

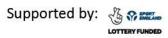

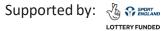

This has been evident in the LA as well where they have improved a wide range of skills and experienced many sports. They have attended a range of events putting into place their skills learnt. The children have further refined their skills and been able to use tactics to outwit their opponent. They have learnt how to work in a team in a competitive environment. As a school, we have ensured that all children feel they have the opportunity to represent our school in a variety of sports. This has increased their confidence and self-belief when their success is celebrated as a school. We have shown all values of the School Games Mark and our own school values in our awards worship.
